Participation in Core & Regular Library Activities in Northern Ireland 2015/16

Annual Report

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#### Notes to users:

- 1. All participant numbers refer to instances of participation rather than individual people.
- 2. All percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number.
- 3. Year-on-year comparisons are figures compared with corresponding ones from the previous year.

# **Summary**

From 1 April 2015 – 31 March 2016, Libraries NI's 96 branch libraries and several of its 16 mobile libraries delivered a range of programmes and activities focused on promoting reading, learning and access to culture, heritage and information. Key findings show that during this period:

- A total of 342,092 participants (125,750 adults and 216,342 children) engaged in 22,622 core and regular activity sessions run by Libraries NI this is a 10% increase in participation and an 11% increase in the number of activity sessions since 2014/15 (309,756 participants and 20,386 sessions respectively). The 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2013/14 (302,117 participants and 19,818 sessions respectively) when information on regular activities was recorded for the first time. There are no corresponding figures for 2012/13 as information was only recorded for core activities in that year.
  - 298,560 participants (82,218 adults and 216,342 children) engaged in 17,272 core activity sessions (i.e. Class visits, Got IT?, Reading Groups, Rhythm and Rhyme and Storytime) this is an increase of 9% in both participation and the number of core activity sessions since 2014/15 (273,512 participants and 15,848 sessions respectively). The 2015/16 core activity figures are also the highest so far since 2012/13.
  - 43,532 adults engaged in 5,350 regular activity sessions (i.e. Genealogy, Go ON!, Job Clubs and Knit and Natter groups) this is a 20% increase in participation and an 18% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (36,244 participants and 4,538 sessions respectively). Participation rates and the number of sessions have steadily increased year-on-year since 2013/14. There are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.

#### **Core Activities**

- Both pupil participation rates in the school class visits programme and the number of sessions increased between 2014/15 and 2015/16, although they remained below the levels in 2013/14. 99,028 children took part in 2015/16 (4,022 sessions), an increase of 3% in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (95,815 children and 3,896 sessions respectively), compared to 103,185 children and 4,208 sessions in 2013/14.
- Adult participation in Got IT? and the number of sessions increased by 6% and 11% respectively between 2014/15 and 2015/16. 3,207 adults took part in 3,084 Got IT? sessions in 2015/16 compared to 3,028 and 2,781 sessions in 2014/15. The 2015/16 figures are also almost at the same level as they were in 2013/14 when they were at their highest (3,294 adults and 3,085 sessions respectively).
- 14,483 participants engaged in 1,942 reading group sessions compared to 13,792 participants and 1,893 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 5% increase in participation and a 3% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. While both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (15,307 participants and 2,001 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (11,544 participants and 1,512 sessions respectively).

- When recording of reading groups started in 2012/13, adult participation was 7,876 at 927 sessions. Since then, the annual rates have increased to more than 10,000 for participation and over 1,250 for the number of sessions. 10,210 adults took part in 1,265 reading group sessions in 2015/16.
- 4,273 children took part in 677 reading group sessions, compared to 3,681 children and 630 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 16% increase in participation and a 7% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. Although both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (4,835 children and 733 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (3,668 children and 585 sessions respectively).
- 159,471 participants (68,801 adults and 90,670 children) engaged in a total of 5,904 Rhythm and Rhyme sessions for pre-school age children (0-4 years), a 14% increase in participation and a 16% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (140,027 participants and 5,100 sessions respectively). Participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2012/13.
- 22,371 children engaged in a total of 2,320 Storytime sessions for 4-8 year olds, a 7% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (20,850 children and 2,178 sessions respectively). Although participation was highest in 2013/14 (24,045 children), the number of sessions in 2015/16 was the highest out of the 4 years from 2012/13.

#### **Regular Activities**

- While the number of genealogy (i.e. family history) activities increased by 31% (from 207 to 271) between 2014/15 and 2015/16, adult participation decreased by 7% (from 1,285 to 1,196). Although participation was highest in 2014/15, the number of sessions in 2015/16 is the highest so far since 2013/14. There are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.
- 3,370 adults participated in 534 Go ON! small group sessions in 2015/16, compared to 2,655 adults and 447 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 27% increase in participation and a 19% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. Participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2013/14 there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.
- 4,534 adults engaged in 884 Job Club sessions in 2015/16, compared to 4,159 adults and 789 sessions in 2014/15 which is a 9% increase in participation and a 12% increase in the number of sessions. Participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2013/14 there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.
- 34,432 adults took part in 3,661 Knit and Natter group sessions in 2015/16 compared to 28,145 adults and 3,095 sessions in 2014/15 which is a 22% increase in participation and an 18% increase in the number of sessions. Participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2013/14 there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.

# **Background**

The Northern Ireland Library Authority (Libraries NI) was established in April 2009 as a result of the Review of Public Administration. Libraries NI has the statutory responsibility for the provision of public library services in Northern Ireland and its functions are laid down in the Libraries Act (Northern Ireland) 2008. It is a Non Departmental Public Body which reports to the Department for Communities (DfC).

Libraries NI provides a number of core and regular activities in the majority of its 96 branch libraries (and in some of its 16 mobile libraries) as part of its programmes to promote reading, learning and access to culture, heritage and information. Core activities are defined as Class Visits, Got IT?, Reading Groups, Rhythm and Rhyme and Storytime, while Regular activities are defined as Genealogy, Go ON!, Job Clubs and Knit and Natter groups.

#### **Definitions**

#### Core Activities

### **Class Visits**

The Class Visits programme is open to all Northern Ireland nursery, primary, post primary and special needs schools and aims to give pupils an insight into the range of services available at their local library, and to encourage them to become members. Classes can come to the library for book exchange, storytelling, craft sessions, to use computers etc.

Within the Class Visits programme, there is a set of activities specifically aimed at primary school age children in Years 4 and 6 and supports Key Stage 1 and 2 language and literacy skills as detailed in the NI Curriculum. This element of the programme offers a series of 3 one hour visits for pupils in these year groups which include a general introduction and tour of the library, activities to help explain the layout of library stock and instruction on the various uses of computers in the library. One-off visits are also available which give pupils a general overview of library services and resources. At the end of each visit, the pupils will listen to a story and there will be an opportunity for them to browse and exchange books.

Libraries NI staff also deliver outreach visits to many schools to promote the various library services and read stories to the pupils.

# Got IT?

Got IT? is a free programme to support people with little or no knowledge of computers and help them develop basic IT skills. The programme is aimed at adults and delivered by Libraries NI staff on a one-to-one or small group basis, with sessions covering the following topics:

- Introduction to computers;
- Introduction to the Internet:
- Introduction to email.

# **Reading Groups**

Reading groups cater for both children and adults and encourage people to read for pleasure, read adventurously, share their enthusiasm about books and develop the confidence to formulate and express opinions about reading.

Libraries NI staff host reading groups for adults and children/teenagers, including those aimed at specific groups in society (e.g. visually impaired, deaf etc.). Such groups generally meet in the library premises, although some are run by Libraries NI staff in other locations. Reading groups hosted by external organisations that meet in the library premises and/or use library resources are also facilitated. A new flexible type of children's reading group called Chatterbooks, run in conjunction with The Reading Agency was introduced in libraries in 2014/15. Sessions are suitable for 7-11 year olds of all different abilities.

# **Rhythm and Rhyme**

Rhythm and Rhyme is a free programme of stories, rhymes and songs delivered on a regular or seasonal basis by Libraries NI staff (or held in partnership with SureStart<sup>1</sup>) for parents, carers and pre-school children (aged 0-4 years). The aim of the programme is to improve children's language and communication skills before they enter formal education.

In addition to sessions that are open to the public, the programme is also available to young children attending day nurseries, playgroups, parent and toddler groups etc. These dedicated sessions are mostly held on the library premises but some are also delivered by Libraries NI staff at external locations (e.g. on playgroup premises, at community centres etc.). On occasions, public sessions are also delivered at external locations as part of community festivals etc.

A number of the mobile libraries now also deliver Rhythm & Rhyme sessions so these are included in the figures.

# **Storytime**

Storytime is a free programme of stories, rhymes and poems delivered on a regular or seasonal basis by Libraries NI staff for children aged 4-8 years.

In addition to sessions that are open to the public, the programme is also available to external organisations attended by children of an equivalent age range (e.g. Rainbows/Cygnets/Brigíní (Girl Guides), Beavers (Boy Scouts), Explorers (Girls' Brigade), Anchor Boys (Boys' Brigade) or after school day care facilities etc.). Such dedicated sessions are mostly held on the library premises but some are also delivered by Libraries NI staff at other locations (e.g. at community centres, church/parish halls etc. or to groups of children who are unable to come to the library, e.g. those in hospice care). On occasions, public sessions are also delivered at external locations as part of community festivals etc.

A number of the mobile libraries now also deliver Storytime sessions so these are included in the figures.

# Regular Activities

### Genealogy

Genealogy is also known as family history and Libraries NI holds various related free activities for adults including talks, presentations and Ancestry Library Edition workshops. Ancestry Library Edition is an online resource which can be accessed free of charge in all libraries within the Libraries NI network (i.e. it is not available to use from external locations such as homes, offices etc.) and people attending the workshops can use it, with the support of Libraries NI staff where required, to search a range of online records. These include census records which are a vital source of information for people researching their family history and allow them to discover the name, age, birth place, occupation, address etc. of their ancestors.

#### Go ON!

Go ON! is a free programme to support people who are able to use a computer, email and the Internet and want to further develop their IT skills with regard to everyday computer tasks, such as paying utility bills or shopping online, online banking, social networking, digital photography, online health enquiries etc. The programme is aimed at adults and modules are delivered by Libraries NI staff on a small group basis.

#### **Job Clubs**

Job Clubs held in partnership with the Jobs & Benefits Office on library premises offer free internet access and other library services to adults who are unemployed. They give people an opportunity to develop their IT skills using the library's computers and participants receive assistance with job hunting, online applications, preparing CVs and interview practice.

Other organisations (e.g. Job Assist, Kickstart to Work, Supported Employment Solutions etc.) use the library facilities to offer similar advice and services to the unemployed and therefore are also included.

# **Knit and Natter**

Knit and Natter groups are held in various libraries across Northern Ireland and are for adults who enjoy knitting, sewing, crochet, cross stitch and other crafts. They are free of charge and participants have the opportunity to share hints and tips, swap patterns, meet new people and learn new skills and can bring along whatever they are already working on or start a new project.


# **Libraries NI Activity Database**

This bulletin presents information on participation in the aforementioned core and regular library activities during 2015/16, collected via the Libraries NI Activity Database which was established in April 2012. During 2012/13 the database collected information on core activities only but was extended to also capture information on regular activities from 2013/14.

# **Findings**


- During 2015/16, a total of 342,092 participants (125,750 adults and 216,342 children) engaged in 22,622 core and regular activity sessions run by Libraries NI this is a 10% increase in participation and an 11% increase in the number of activity sessions since 2014/15 (309,756 participants and 20,386 sessions respectively). The 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2013/14 (302,117 participants and 19,818 sessions respectively) when information on regular activities was recorded for the first time. #### **Core Activities**

#### **Class Visits**

During 2015/16, 99,028 children took part in the school class visits programme (4,022 sessions), an increase of 3% in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (95,815 children and 3,896 sessions respectively). Although both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (103,185 children and 4,208 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (86,880 children and 3,583 sessions respectively).


- o 13,809 were pupils from nursery schools or primary schools with an associated nursery unit (515 sessions 247 of which were outreach sessions held on school premises). This represents a 3% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (13,450 children and 502 sessions respectively). Pupil participation in nursery visits and the number of sessions has increased year-on-year since 2012/13.
- 83,752 were pupils from primary or special needs schools (3,443 sessions), a 3% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (81,330 children and 3,338 sessions respectively). Although both participation rates and the number of primary/special needs sessions were highest in 2013/14 (90,211 children and 3,739 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (78,520 children and 3,247 sessions respectively).
  - 36,812 participated in a set of structured activities aimed at pupils in Year 4 & Year 6 to support Key Stage 1 & 2 of the NI curriculum with regard to language and literacy skills (1,461 sessions), a 3% increase in participation and a 1% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (35,815 children and 1,448 sessions respectively). Although both participation rates and the number of structured class visits were highest in 2013/14 (43,108 children and 1,775 sessions respectively), pupil participation in 2015/16 is also higher than in 2012/13 (35,966 children) while the number of visits is only slightly lower than in 2012/13 (1,480 sessions).
  - The remaining 46,940 exchanged books and/or listened to stories, took part in crafts etc. (1,982 sessions 144 of which were outreach sessions held on school premises), which represents a 3% increase in participation and a 5% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (45,515 children and 1,890 sessions respectively). Although the number of sessions was highest in 2015/16, pupil participation in such class visits was highest in 2013/14 (47,103 children).
- 1,467 were pupils from post primary schools (64 sessions), a 42% increase in participation and a 14% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (1,035 children and 56 sessions respectively). Although pupil participation was highest in 2013/14 (1,746 children), the number of post primary class visits was highest in 2012/13 (84 sessions).

#### Got IT?

[See Figure 4 and Table 11]

3,207 adults participated in 3,084 Got IT? sessions in 2015/16, compared to 3,028 adults and 2,781 sessions in 2014/15. This is an increase of 6% in participation and an increase of 11% in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. The 2015/16 figures are also almost at the same level as they were in 2013/14 when they were at their highest (3,294 adults and 3,085 sessions respectively).

- 2,998 adults participated in Got IT? on a one-to-one basis in 2015/16 compared to 2,641 in 2014/15, an increase of 14%. The 2015/16 figures for one-to-one sessions are the highest so far out of the 4 years from 2012/13.
- 209 adults took part in 86 small group Got IT? sessions, which represents a 46% decrease in participation and a 39% decrease in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (387 adults and 140 sessions respectively). The 2015/16 figures for small group sessions are also lower than in 2013/14 (358 adults and 149 sessions respectively) but higher than in 2012/13 (164 adults and 69 sessions respectively).

#### **Reading Groups**

[See Figure 5 and Table 12]

- During 2015/16, 14,483 participants engaged in 1,942 reading group sessions compared to 13,792 participants and 1,893 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 5% increase in participation and a 3% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. While both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (15,307 participants and 2,001 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (11,544 participants and 1,512 sessions respectively).
  - 0 10,210 adults took part in 1,265 reading group sessions, compared to 10,111 adults and 1,263 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 1% increase in participation while the number of sessions has effectively remained unchanged from 2014/15 to 2015/16. Although both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (10,472 adults and 1,268 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (7,876 adults and 927 sessions respectively).

4,273 children took part in 677 reading group sessions, compared to 3,681 children and 630 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 16% increase in participation and a 7% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. Although both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (4,835 children and 733 sessions respectively), the 2015/16 figures are also higher than those in 2012/13 (3,668 children and 585 sessions respectively).

- 976 children took part in 148 Chatterbooks sessions for 7-11 year olds which is a 30% increase in participation and a 41% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. 2014/15 was the first year information was recorded for this type of reading group so there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13 or 2013/14.
- 947 children took part in 140 sessions for 7-9 year olds, a 26% increase in participation and an 11% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (751 children and 126 sessions respectively).
- 1,839 children took part in 287 sessions for 9-11 year olds, a 16% increase in participation and a 2% decrease in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (1,581 children and 294 sessions respectively).

**Note:** Although participation rates and the numbers of reading group sessions for both 7-9 year olds and 9-11 year olds were higher in 2012/13 and 2013/14 than in the subsequent 2 years, this may be partly due to the introduction of the Chatterbooks reading groups in 2014/15 which are also suitable for these age groups.

511 children took part in 102 sessions for those aged 12+ years, a 15% decrease in participation and a 3% decrease in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (599 children and 105 sessions respectively). These 2015/16 figures are also the lowest out of all the years so far since 2012/13.

#### Rhythm and Rhyme

During 2015/16, 159,471 participants (68,801 adults and 90,670 children) engaged in a total of 5,904 Rhythm and Rhyme sessions for pre-school age children (0-4 years), a 14% increase in participation and a 16% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (140,027 participants and 5,100 sessions respectively). Both participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2012/13.

- 133,337 participants (60,866 adults and 72,471 children) took part in 4,602 sessions open to the public, a 12% increase in participation and a 15% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (119,572 participants and 4,009 sessions respectively). Participation rates and the number of public sessions have increased year-on-year since 2012/13.
- 26,134 participants (7,935 adults and 18,199 children) took part in 1,302 dedicated sessions held exclusively for day nurseries, playgroups and parent and toddler groups etc., which is a 28% increase in participation and a 19% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (20,455 participants and 1.091 sessions respectively). Participation rates and the number of dedicated sessions have increased year-on-year since 2012/13.
- 147,481 participants (65,693 adults and 81,788 children) attended 5,297 sessions that were held on the library premises/mobile library, a 13% increase in participation and a 16% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (130,101 participants and 4,578 sessions respectively). Participation rates and the number of library sessions have increased year-on-year since 2012/13.
- 11,990 participants (3,108 adults and 8,882 children) attended 607 sessions that took place at another location, which is a 21% increase in participation and a 16% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (9,926 participants and 522 sessions respectively). Participation rates and the number of outreach sessions have increased year-on-year and the 2015/16 figures are approximately four times higher than those in 2012/13.

During 2015/16, 22,371 children engaged in a total of 2,320 Storytime sessions for 4-8 year olds, a 7% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (20,850 children and 2,178 sessions respectively). Although participation was highest in 2013/14 (24,045 children), the number of sessions in 2015/16 are the highest out of the 4 years from 2012/13.

17,410 children took part in 1,960 sessions open to the public, a 6% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (16,362 children and 1,853 sessions respectively). Although participation was highest in 2012/13 (18,121 children), the number of public sessions in 2015/16 are the highest so far since 2012/13.

- 4,961 children took part in 360 dedicated sessions held exclusively for external organisations attended by children of an equivalent age range such as Rainbows/Cygnets/Brigíní (Girl Guides), Beavers (Boy Scouts), Explorers (Girls' Brigade), Anchor Boys (Boys' Brigade) or after school day care facilities etc., which is an 11% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2014/15 (4,488 children and 325 sessions respectively). The 2015/16 participation figures are also more than double those in 2012/13 (2,001 children) but still considerably lower than those in 2013/14 (7,053 children) whereas the number of dedicated sessions in 2015/16 is more than three times that in 2012/13 (114 sessions) but only slightly higher than that in 2013/14 (346 sessions).
- 19.482 children attended 2,116 sessions that were held on the library premises/mobile library, a 6% increase in both participation and the number of sessions since 2015/16 (18,334 participants and 1,992 sessions respectively). Although participation was highest in 2013/14 (20,907 children), the number of library/mobile sessions in 2015/16 are the highest so far out of the 4 years from 2012/13.


2,889 children attended 204 sessions that took place at another location, which is a 15% increase in participation and a 10% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (2,516 participants and 186 sessions respectively). Although participation was highest in 2013/14 (3,138 children), the number of outreach sessions in 2015/16 are the highest so far out of the 4 years from 2012/13.

# **Regular Activities**

#### **Genealogy**

[See Figure 8 and Table 15]

1,196 adults took part in 271 genealogy (i.e. family history) activities in 2015/16.
This is a 7% decrease in participation and a 31% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 (1,285 adults and 207 sessions respectively). Although participation was highest in 2014/15, the number of sessions in 2015/16 is the highest so far since 2013/14. There are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.




- 593 adults attended talks or presentations (43 sessions), compared to 689 adults and 37 sessions in 2014/15. This is a decrease of 14% in participation and an increase of 16% in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. Although participation was highest in 2014/15, the number of sessions in 2015/16 is the highest so far since 2013/14.
- 603 adults engaged in family history workshops using Ancestry Library Edition (228 sessions), compared to 596 adults and 170 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 1% increase in participation and a 34% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. The 2015/16 figures are the highest so far since 2013/14.

#### Go ON!


3,370 adults participated in 534 Go ON! small group sessions in 2015/16, compared to 2,655 adults and 447 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 27% increase in participation and a 19% increase in the number of sessions from 2014/15 to 2015/16. Participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2013/14 – there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.



**Job Clubs**

4,534 adults engaged in 884 Job Club sessions in 2015/16, compared to 4,159 adults and 789 sessions in 2014/15 which is a 9% increase in participation and a 12% increase in the number of sessions. Participation rates and the number of sessions have increased year-on-year since 2013/14 – there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.




- o 3,179 adults engaged in 619 sessions held in partnership with the Jobs & Benefits Office in 2015/16 compared to 3,022 adults and 570 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 5% increase in participation and a 9% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 although both participation rates and the number of sessions were highest in 2013/14 (3,967 adults and 651 sessions respectively).
- 1,355 adults engaged in 265 sessions held in association with other organisations (e.g. Job Assist, Kickstart to Work, Supported Employment Solutions etc.) compared to 1,137 adults and 219 sessions in 2014/15. This is a 19% increase in participation and a 21% increase in the number of sessions since 2014/15 which was the first year such information was recorded.


#### **Knit and Natter**

34,432 adults participated in 3,661 Knit and Natter group sessions in 2015/16 compared to 28,145 adults and 3,095 sessions in 2014/15 which is a 22% increase in participation and an 18% increase in the number of sessions. Participation rates and the number of sessions have steadily increased year-on-year since 2013/14 – there are no corresponding figures for 2012/13.

# **Data source and validations**

Data from the Libraries NI Activity Database are used for this publication. The data are input to this system by the 96 branch managers (and several of the 16 mobile library managers where applicable) on a daily, weekly or monthly basis and are downloaded into MS Excel at the end of each month and then read into SPSS. Validations are carried out to ensure that the data are reliable and robust for use. Any inconsistencies or inaccuracies are reported back to the branch/mobile library managers and the data is amended where necessary. Once all amendments have been made to the data, SPSS syntax is used to produce the tables in the bulletin. Information is presented at Northern Ireland Library Authority level but further breakdowns may be available on request.
