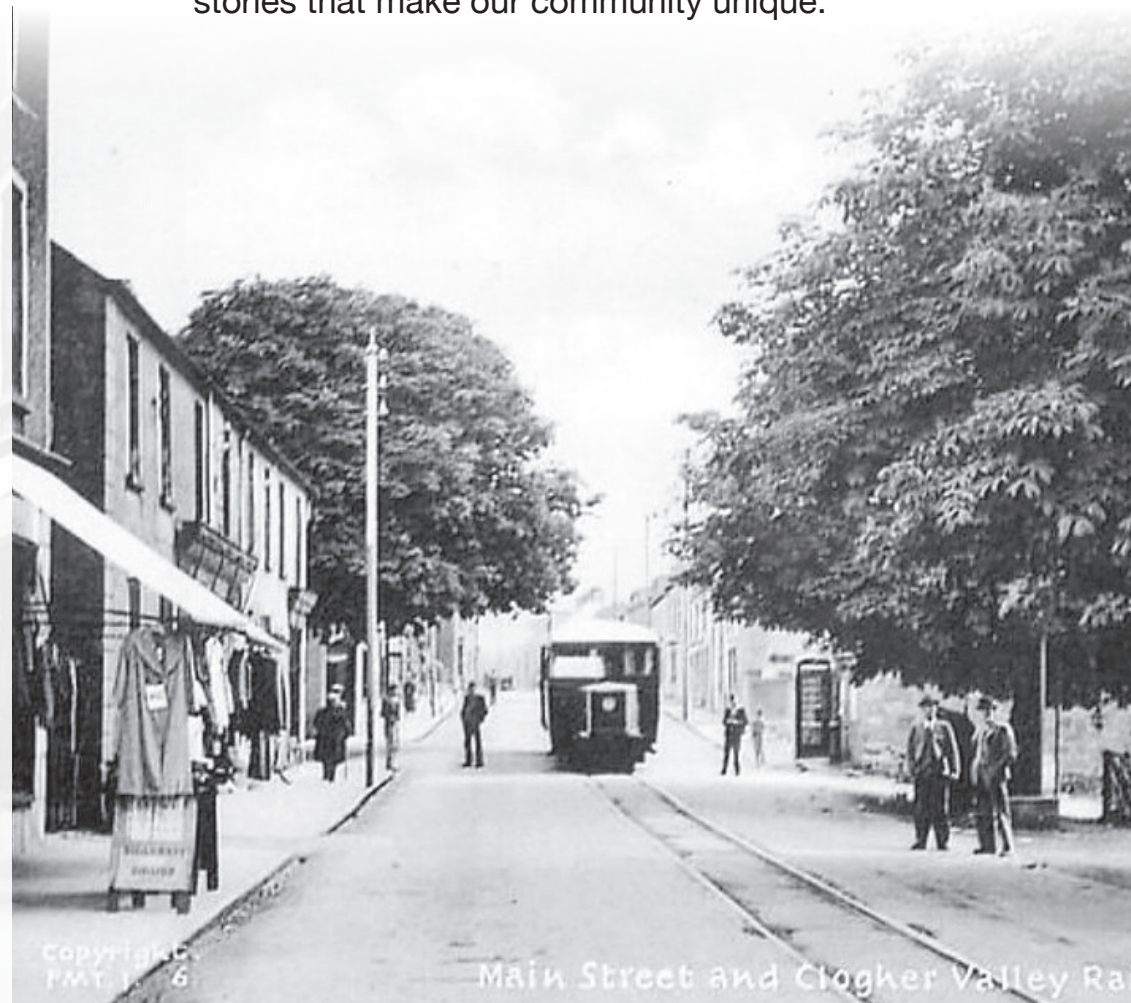

Fivemiletown Three Centuries of History (1650-1950)

Thursday 5 February at 3:00pm

Clogher Valley historian Jack Johnston presents an illustrated talk exploring Fivemiletown's history from 1650 to 1950. Using a PowerPoint presentation, the session features Hearth Rolls, Registry of Deeds sources, estate records and churches, as well as the mail coaches and the railway.

The talk will be accompanied by an exhibition of billheads relating to Fivemiletown. If you have an early billhead relating to the town, you are encouraged to bring it along.

Mills around Fivemiletown with Sebastian Graham

Friday 6 February at 3:00pm

In this talk Sebastian, an expert in the architecture and built heritage of Ulster's linen industry will focus on mills in the Fivemiletown area. Mills were once central to the rural economy and everyday life in many communities. Water power was used for activities such as linen bleaching, corn milling and flax scutching. Some mills date back to the plantation period, while others were built in response to the growing demand for linen, particularly during the 1700s.

Come along to hear more about their history and social importance.
